Learning Project WEEK 4	- Celebrations (Easter)
Age Range: Y5/6	
Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
 Get your child to play on <u>Times Table</u> <u>Rockstars</u>. <u>MyMaths</u> work through set tasks. Whiterose Maths <u>https://whiterosemaths.com/homelearning/</u> Ask your child to go on a "measure hunt" to find as many different types of measurement used around the house. Encourage them to think about what they measure, what units are used, different ways the same measurement can be written eg 500ml = ½ litre = 0.5litre. Can they estimate the mass, capacity or length of some of the things around the house and then see how close they were. Perhaps, they could practise measuring mass by doing some Easter baking. Look at some of the statistics on: <u>https://www.finder.com/uk/easter-spending- statistics</u> Encourage your child to use some of this information to create a bar graph or pie cart of their own. Or they could conduct their own Easter Egg survey within the family and create their own graphs or calculate percentages using this information. Get your child to work on their <u>reasoning and problem</u> <u>solving</u> by practising past SATs questions that are broken down into topic areas and have videos linked to them that can be watched if needed. As these are older papers these are suitable for both years 5 and 6. Click on one of the topic areas listed to gain access to the questions. 	 Ask your child to read a chapter from their home reading book or a book that they have borrowed from the library. Your child can now design an alternative book cover for their chapter book. Ask your child to research how Easter is celebrated in different countries and create a poster to show what they have learnt. Read the events of Easter in the Bible. Think about the story from different points of view. Watch Newsround and discuss what is happening in the wider world.
Weekly Spelling Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 2-3 per week)
 Ask your child to think of as many words as they can to do with Easter or spring. Then use these to make their own wordsearch. As a family, play a game of "Easter Boggle". Using the letters from the phrase, "CHOCOLATE EASTER EGG", see how many words you can all make using the letters from the phrase in 3 minutes. (Grown-ups have to have at least 4 letters in their words!) Your child could create their own Easter Cross or Easter Egg word cloud using words associated with Easter. 	 Ask your child to choose one of the Biblical events told during Holy Week (Jesus entering Jerusalem, the Last Supper, the Crucifixion or Resurrection). Then ask your child to re-write the story choosing one of these genres: Playscript Diary from one of the character's point of view Newspaper report Interview with one of the characters Write an Easter prayer. Design your own Easter Egg or choose an existing Easter Egg. Write a voiceover for a TV advert for your egg encouraging people to buy it. Write an explanation leaflet explaining how Easter is celebrated in this country or another country. Write an Easter quiz for your family to do.
